The SRI LANKA MEDICAL COUNCIL (SLMC) is a statutory body established for the purpose of protecting healthcare seekers by ensuring the maintenance of academic and professional standards, discipline, and ethical practice by health professionals who are registered with it.

The SLMC derives its statutory powers from the Medical Ordinance No. 26 of 1927 and its subsequent amendments and the regulations gazetted under the Ordinance.

To ensure, that patients are treated and cared for by competent, humane, ethical, and safe healthcare professionals.

MISSION

To protect, promote, and maintain the health and safety of the public by setting, maintaining, and raising standards of education and practice of healthcare across the country.

THE SLMC HISTORY




How it began 1870 - 1880

The longest standing Medical School in Sri Lanka, the Colombo Medical School, was founded on 1st June 1870 and admitted twenty-five students. They were awarded a diploma of Licentiate in Medicine and Surgery (L.M.S.). In 1880, the school was named the Ceylon Medical College and the L.M.S. was registered with the General Medical Council of Britain without further examination.

Registered practitioners 1905 - 1915

The Medical Registration Ordinance was passed in 1905 and persons with L.M.S. (Ceylon) were recognized as medical practitioners and registered to practice medicine and surgery by the Ceylon Medical College Council (CMCC). Any person registered in a country which recognized this diploma was also registered by the CMCC. The Medical Registration Ordinance of 1905 also made provision for erasure of the name of a registered person.



In 1915, the Dentists Registration Ordinance was introduced to register dentists to practice dentistry.





Extended provision for registration 1920 - 1927

Midwives were earlier registered under the Midwives Ordinance No. 02 of 1920. Provision was made in the Medical Ordinance of 1924 for the registration of midwives. Eligibility for registration as midwives is restricted to women.

The Medical Ordinance No. 26 of 1927 made provision for registration of pharmacists and dispensing of drugs and poisons was restricted only to registered pharmacists and pharmaceutical chemists.

The Medical (Amendment) Ordinance No. 26 of 1927 made provision for erasure on disciplinary grounds. The procedure for disciplinary inquiries currently applicable was published in the Government Gazette No. 757/7 of March 10, 1993.

University ordinance and internship 1942

Following the establishment of the University of Ceylon by the University Ordinance of 1942, the MBBS degree and the BDS degree awarded by it were also recognized for registration by the CMCC.


The Medical (Amendment) Act No.23 of 1955 made provision for provisional registration of medical graduates to obtain pre-registration experience by serving a period of internship. It includes "good character" as a requirement for registration.



Temporary registration of medical practitioners 1946 - 1997

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 25 of 1946 made provision for the temporary registration of medical practitioners when there is a delay in the award of a degree and subsequent amendment for registration on other grounds.

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 37 of 1961 made provision for temporary registration of medical practitioners, dentists and nurses who are invited by the government to serve the country. This was amended by the Medical (Amendment) Act No. 31 of 1997 where registration is recommended by the Secretary, Ministry of Health, the Director General of Health Services or a Dean of a Medical Faculty. Registration is restricted for a period of twelve months; the skill and knowledge of the applicant is judged by the Council.



The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 10 of 1949 made provision for registration of nurses by the Ceylon Medical Council. This function is now under the Sri Lanka Nurses Council, which was established by Act No 19 of 1988, and later amended by Act no 35 of 2005.





Registration to ERPM and ERPDS 1965

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 16 of 1965 made provision for registration of citizens of Sri Lanka who have obtained a degree or diploma from a medical school outside Sri Lanka and recognized by the Council to be registered following a special examination conducted by the Council and after serving an internship. The special examination was previously known as the Act 16 examination and is now referred to as the Examination for Registration to Practice Medicine (ERPM) in Sri Lanka and the Examination for Registration to Practice Dental Surgery (ERPDS) in Sri Lanka.

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 30 of 1987 made provision for the registration of para-medical assistants. Persons included in this category are radiographers, medical laboratory technologists, physiotherapists, occupational therapists, electrocardiograph recordists, audiologists, clinical physiologists, speech therapists, chiropodists, dietitians, ophthalmic auxiliaries and clinical psychologists.


The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 30 of 1987 introduced the requirement for renewal of registration at 5-year intervals.

Medical (Amendment) Act No. 30 of 1987 made provision for persons who are employed as medical officers in government service to be granted registration during the period of such employment.



Registration of overseas qualification 1996

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 15 of 1996 made provision for registration of citizens of Sri Lanka who have obtained a degree or diploma from a medical school outside Sri Lanka and recognized by the Council, to be registered if they were in employment of the Department of Health Services prior to May 17, 1991.







Registration of medical and dental specialists 2018

The Medical (Amendment) Act No. 28 of 2018 made provision for registration of medical and dental specialists.



CHAIR'S FOREWORD



I am pleased to provide this message to the Annual Report of the Sri Lanka Medical Council for the year 2021 at the conclusion of my first year as President. It is noteworthy that this is the first annual report of the Council after the year 2011.

The unsettled environment in the field of medical education over the preceding five years and the COVID-19 pandemic had had a profound effect on the functioning of the Council. The Council took cognisance of this and decided to take steps to address the most pressing issues. The year 2021, therefore, marked the beginning of a period of reform in the way the Council conducted its affairs. The Committees of the Council were reactivated and they started meeting regularly. The Standard Operating Procedures of the Council were revised. The website of the Council was revamped to make it more user friendly. The foreign degree approval procedures were streamlined and made more efficient in keeping with the Minimum Standards in Medical Education Regulations that came into effect on 10 April 2021. The conduct of the Examinations to Practice Medicine and Dentistry in Sri Lanka that were held up were restarted and the foundation was laid to hold the exams twice a year. The conduct of the disciplinary inquiries that had been severely delayed were restarted.

The Council also faced several challenges. The election of members to the Council had several setbacks due to legal action. As a result while the election of specialist practitioners was concluded, the other elections were delayed pending gazetting of the election regulations of the Council. The COVID-19 pandemic severely affected medical education. While the Sri Lankan medical schools quickly adapted to the situation and commenced onsite hands-on hospital based clinical training, many medical students in foreign medical schools were unable to return back to those countries to continue their clinical training. The Council took steps to inform students that onsite hands-on hospital based clinical training was mandatory for their degree recognition. The vast majority of students heeded the Council's advice. Those who did not and obtained degrees without completing the mandatory hands-on hospital based clinical training were denied degree approval. This matter remained unresolved at the end of 2021. It would be an ongoing challenge for the Council in 2022. The Council also had to face the challenge of conducting the onsite Oath's ceremony for the practitioners who received full registration in view of the restrictions on public gatherings. This was overcome by conducting the ceremony online.

The year 2021 was also a year when the Council took steps to look at the future. The Council took steps to initiate the process of reforming the Examination to Practice Medicine in Sri Lanka in keeping with other international licentiate examinations. The Council also initiated a process of giving further legal effect to its activities by drafting new regulations. The Council took steps to commence a process of reforming the organisational structure and human recourses requirements and practices by awarding a consultancy to Ernst and Young. The Council also strengthened its financial and administrative practices by establishing the

necessary oversight committees. The most important step however was the establishment of the Accreditation Unit of the Council with the aim of the Unit functioning as an independent organisation accredited by the World Federation of Medical Education so that it could accredit medical schools on behalf of the Council to make such medical schools, especially the Sri Lankan medical faculties, recognised around the world.

It would be evident from the foregoing that the year 2021 was a very busy year for the Council. The outcome of that was that the Council ended the year as a strong and vibrant organisation that is more geared to regulate the education and practice of practitioners under its purview.

I wish to thank the Registrar, Assistant Registrar, the Council Members and other officials of the Council for their hard work and dedication that made it possible to undertake all these activities.

The Council is well aware of its duty to the general public to ensure that they receive care in a safe environment from competent practitioners. We are confident that the above-mentioned reforms that we have undertaken in the Council would make it possible for us to play that role more effectively in the years to come.

REGISTRAR'S FOREWORD



I would like to begin by thanking the Sri Lanka Medical Council for being responsive to circumstances imposed by the COVID-19 pandemic and initiating reforms in the SLMC secretariat. In the year 2020, COVID-19 posed challenges that nobody would have predicted. However, the SLMC administration responded to the COVID situation by implementing a work-from-home programme and providing dedicated safe transport facilities to the staff to maintain uninterrupted services.

Amidst COVID obstacles, 2021 was a landmark year for the SLMC in terms of positive developments. Appointing a new President, initiating a paperless green office concept, and establishing new administrative units are a few to be mentioned.

The SLMC was working towards achieving recognition for its accreditation programme from the World Federation of Medical Education (WFME) and established the Accreditation Unit. The SLMC administration complimented the Accreditation Unit by providing a refurbished property located at Hedges Court Avenue in Colombo 10 with the necessary staff.

The SLMC has taken steps to renovate the secretariat by introducing various digital features to enhance the speed and effectiveness of the administration. Initiating procurement of a digital archiving system, Electronic Office Management system, and renovating the website were steps taken to establish a paperless green office concept that would be in operation by the end of 2022.

The SLMC secretariat has streamlined the office procedures and protocols for registering professionals, recognising foreign medical degree programmes, holding licensing examinations at regular intervals, and conducting disciplinary inquiries to maintain the discipline of the professionals. The SLMC continues to be in excellent financial health, meeting projected financial targets.

Drawing on our experience of 96 years and a strong foundation, I look forward to a successful 2022 as we continue to grow in delivering services to the Sri Lankan public and healthcare professionals registered with the SLMC.

GOVERNANCE

Role of the Council

- Maintenance of standards and discipline of registrants.
- ► Change of information of the registrants, such as names, addresses, NIC numbers, etc.
- Entering of additional qualifications in the relevant registries.
- Issuing certified extracts from the relevant registries.
- ▶ Renewal and restoration of names in the registries.
- ▶ Recognition of government hospitals for internship.
- ▶ Verifications of registration of the registrants.
- ▶ Registration of specialists in the specialist register.
- ▶ Issue of certificates of registration.
- ► Replying to inquiries regarding registrations.
- ▶ Issue of certificates of good standing to the registrants.
- ► Issue of identity cards to registrants.
- ▶ Registration of apprentice pharmacists and issue of indenture.
- ▶ Approval of degrees of the foreign graduates (Medical and Dental).
- ► Conduct of ERPM/ERPDS examinations for medical and dental graduates who qualified abroad.
- ► Inquire into disciplinary complaints.
- ▶ Recognition of foreign medical and dental schools and maintaining registry of such approved schools.
- ► Certification of documents approved by the Council.

Constitution and Duties of the Council

Part III of the Medical Ordinance defines the constitution and duties of the SLMC as summarised below:

1. The Medical Council shall be a body incorporated by the name and style of the "Sri Lanka Medical Council" having perpetual succession and a common seal with power to sue and to be sued in such name and to acquire and hold property movable and immovable and shall consist of members appointed by the Minister of Health, Ex-Officio members, nominated members by the Universities established under the Universities Act,

elected members from among the medical practitioners, dentists, persons entitled to practice medicine, specialist medical practitioners, and specialist dentists. The Minister appoints the President, and the Vice President is elected from the members of the Council.

- 2. The duties of the Medical Council:
 - ► Maintain the standards of professions registered with the Council (Minimum Standards Regulations);
 - ▶ Maintain the discipline of the practitioners (Disciplinary Procedure Regulations), and maintenance of registries.
- 3. The Medical Council shall appoint a registrar, who shall act as secretary of the Medical Council and also as treasurer unless the Medical Council shall appoint another person as treasurer and may appoint an assistant registrar who shall assist the registrar in the performance of his duties under this Ordinance.
- 4. Regulations may be made by the Council for all or any of the following purposes.
 - a. The election of members to the Medical Council and of the Vice President.
 - b. The procedure at meetings of the Medical Council, including the quorum.
 - c. The appointment, suspension, removal, duties, and remuneration of officers and servants of the Medical Council.
 - d. The keeping of the accounts of the receipts and expenses in carrying out the provisions of this Ordinance, and the auditing of such accounts.
 - e. The maintenance of minimum standards of medical education, including standards relating to courses of study, examinations, staff, equipment, accommodation, training and other facilities at the universities and other institutions which grant or confer any qualification which entitles a person to obtain registration under this Ordinance.
 - f. The maintenance of minimum standards of postgraduate medical education at universities and other institutions.
- 5. The Council conducts its affairs, discusses matters, and takes decisions through monthly Council meetings and establishes various committees and panels.
- 6. The Council has established separate independent Units.
 - ▲ Examinations Unit to conduct licensing examinations
 - ▲ Accreditation Unit to accredit degree programs
 - ▲ Legal Unit to address litigations and assist disciplinary procedures
 - ▲ Foreign Degrees Unit to recognise foreign degree programs

- 7. The Council provides multiple services to the registrants and the public.
 - A Registration of practitioners, renewal of registrations at fixed intervals
 - ▲ Issuing Good Standing Certificates and verification of registration service
 - ▲ Issuing copies of certificates
 - ▲ Verifying the registrations of the practitioners

HIGHLIGHTS OF THE YEAR 2021

JAN

- Accreditation Unit of the SLMC was established with the mandate to function as an independent accreditation organisation recognised by the World Federation of Medical Education to accredit medical schools on behalf of the SLMC.
- ▲ Dr. Gamini Nawarathne was elected uncontested to represent Dental Specialists in the SLMC.
- ▲ The Foreign Degrees Unit was established and a new streamlined process for recognition of foreign medical degree programmes was introduced.
- ▲ On 26 January 2021, a representative group of Sri Lankan medical students in Chinese Universities and their parents met with the President, SLMC to discuss the issues created by the closure of the Chinese border to foreign nationals.

FEB

▲ The ceremony to administer the Medical Practitioner's Oath was conducted as a hybrid event on 20 February 2021.

MAR

- ▲ The new SLMC Website was launched.
- ▲ The conducting of disciplinary inquires, that had been long delayed, was restarted.

APR

- ▲ The Minimum Standards of Medical Education Regulation No. 01 of 2018, published in the Extraordinary Gazette No. 2055/54 of 26 January 2018, approved by the Parliament came into effect from 10 April 2021.
- A Recognition was granted for Internship Training to Base Hospital, Kamburupitiya.
- ▲ The election to elect specialist medical practitioners to the Council was held on 6 and 7 April 2021 and Prof. Janaka De Silva, Dr. Sunil Wijayasinghe and Dr. Duminda Samarasinghe were elected to the Council.

JUN

▲ The holding of the Examination for Registration to Practice Medicine and Dentistry in Sri Lanka was streamlined and arrangements made to hold the examination twice a year.

JUL

- ▲ On 1 July 2021 the SLMC held a Zoom Webinar for foreign medical graduates to explain to them the regulatory position of the SLMC with regards to medical training during the COVID-19 pandemic. Over 700 participants participated in the webinar.
- ▲ The ceremony to administer the Dental Practitioner's Oath was conducted as a hybrid event on 31 July 2021.

AUG

A meeting with the Chinese Ambassador was held on 09 August 2021 with the participation of the Minister of Health, Secretary Health, Director General of Health Services, and the Chairman, University Grants Commission to impress on the Ambassador to request the Chinese government to allow Sri Lankan medical students to return to China.

SEP

▲ In response to observed noncompliance with minimum standards of medical education regulations by some foreign graduates, the SLMC published notices in national newspapers and on the website informing the general public that the SLMC shall accept only onsite hands-on hospital based clinical training.

OCT

▲ The ceremony to administer the Medical Practitioner's Oath was conducted as a hybrid event on 02 October 2021.


NOV

Verifications

The Sri Lanka Medical Council provides the following verification services:

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Raise Concerns

The Sri Lanka Medical Council has the power to inquire into complaints made against any practitioner registered with the Council.

In making a compliant:

- ► The complaint should be made by way of a letter addressed to the President along with an affidavit stating facts/matters alleged against the medical practitioner/s.
- ▶ The full name/s of the accused practitioners should be clearly stated in the affidavit.

The full name/s of the complainant/s along with the contact address and the telephone numbers should be clearly stated in the covering letter.

Inquiry Procedure at SLMC

Preliminary Inquiry:

▶ This is a fact-finding inquiry conducted by the Preliminary Proceedings Committee (PPC) chaired by the Vice President of the Council. The complainant/s and the accused practitioners have to appear before the inquiry. They cannot retain legal counsel at this inquiry. The findings of this committee will be referred to the President for a determination as to whether to proceed with an Inquiry by the Professional Conduct committee.

Professional Conduct Inquiry:

► This is an inquiry conducted by the Professional Conduct Committee (PCC) chaired by the President of the Council. The complainant/s and the accused practitioner/s must appear before the inquiry. The accused practitioner/s may retain legal counsel at this inquiry. The outcome of the inquiry may be exonerate from charges, temporary suspension or erasure from the register.

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3. Accreditation Unit

The Accreditation Unit (AU) is an independent body with the responsibility of developing the policies and procedures for making accreditation decisions in compliance with the "Medical (Maintenance of Minimum Standards of Medical Education) Regulations No. 01 of 2018" to maintain standards of medical schools in Sri Lanka. To facilitate the process and ensure quality, the necessary regulations (Gazetted Minimum Standards of Medical Education Regulations-2021), application forms and guidelines have been developed. In the accreditation process, the AU is concerned with both academic and professional matters.

The AU is presently engaged with the important task of obtaining recognition from the World Federation of Medical Education as its recognised agency in Sri Lanka. Such recognition will permit the medical practitioners with the MBBS qualification obtained from recognised medical faculties of the AU of the SLMC to obtain employment overseas.

Examination for Registration to Practice Medicine (ERPM)/Examination for Registration to Practice Dentistry (ERPDS)

ERPM/ERPDS is conducted by the SLMC for citizens of Sri Lanka who have obtained their Medical/Dental qualification from medical schools overseas. It was previously referred to as the Act 16 Examination. The candidates should possess an MBBS or equivalent degree from a medical school recognised by the SLMC, to be eligible to sit this examination. Passing the ERPM/ERPDS enables them to apply for Provisional Registration with the SLMC.

Report on the Financial Statements

Opinion

1. CORPORATE INFORMATION

1.1 General

Sri Lanka Medical Council ("The Council") is registered as a Statutory Body under the Medical Ordinance No.26 of 1927. The registered office of the Council is located at No.31, Norris Canal Road, Colombo 10.

1.2 Principal Activities and Nature of Operations

The Council is established for the purpose of protecting health care seekers by ensuring the maintenance of academic and professional standards, discipline and ethical practice by health professionals who are registered with the Medical Council.

1.3 Date of Authorization for Issue

The Financial Statements of Sri Lanka Medical Council for the year ended 31 December 2021 were authorized for issue in accordance with a resolution of the Finance Committee on 30 September 2022.

2. BASIS OF PREPARATION AND SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.1 Basis of Preparation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Sri Lankan Accounting Standards issued by the Institute of Chartered Accountants of Sri Lanka and are presented in Sri Lanka Rupees.

2.1.1 Going Concern

The company's current liabilities exceeded its current assets by Rs. 61,037,526/- (2020- Rs. 48,066,955/-). However, the council has invested in fixed deposits and treasury bills amounting Rs. 892,451,960/- (2020- Rs. 821,807,385/-) as of the reporting date. The Financial Statements of the Council have been prepared on the assumption that the Council would be able to continue its operations in the foreseeable future.

2.1.2 Comparative Information

The accounting policies have been consistently applied by the Council with those used in the previous year. Certain prior year figures and phrases have been re-arranged whenever necessary to conform to the current year's presentation.

2.2 CHANGES IN ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The accounting policies adopted are consistent with those of the previous financial year.

2.3 SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

2.3.1 Taxation

a) Current Taxes

Current income tax assets and liabilities for the current and prior periods are measured at the amount expected to be recovered from or paid to the Commissioner General of Inland Revenue. The tax rates and tax laws used to compute the amount are those that are enacted or substantively enacted by the reporting date.

The provision for income tax is based on the elements of income and expenditure as reported in the financial statements and computed in accordance with the provisions of the Inland Revenue Act.

b) Deferred Taxation

Deferred income tax is provided, using the liability method, on all temporary differences at the date of statement of financial position between the tax bases of assets and liabilities and their carrying amounts for financial reporting purposes. Deferred income tax liabilities are recognized for all taxable temporary differences.

Deferred income tax assets are recognized for all deductible temporary differences, carry-forward of unused tax assets and unused tax losses, to the extent that it is probable that taxable profit will be available against which the deductible temporary differences, and the carry-forward of unused tax assets and unused tax losses can be utilized.

The carrying amount of deferred income tax assets is reviewed at each date of statement of financial position and reduced to the extent that it is no longer probable that sufficient taxable profit will be available to allow all or part of the deferred income tax asset to be utilized.

Deferred income tax assets and liabilities are measured at the tax rates that are expected to apply to the year when the asset is realized or the liability is settled, based on tax rates (and tax laws) that have been enacted or substantively enacted at the date of statement of financial position.

Deferred income tax relating to items recognized directly in equity is recognized in equity and not in profit or loss.

2.3.2 Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are cash in hand, demand deposits and short-term highly liquid investments, readily convertible to known amounts of cash and subject to insignificant risk of changes in value.

For the purpose of receipts and payments statement, cash and cash equivalents consist of cash in hand and deposits in banks net of outstanding bank overdrafts. Investments with short maturities i.e. three months or less from the date of acquisition are also treated as cash equivalents.

2.3.3 Foreign Currency Translation

The financial statements are presented in Sri Lanka Rupees, which is the Council's functional and presentation currency. Transactions in foreign currencies are initially recorded at the functional currency rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the functional currency rate of exchange ruling at the date of statement of financial position. All differences are taken to the statement of Income and Expenditure. Non-monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are not re-translated.

2.3.4 Property, Plant and Equipment

Items of property, plant and equipment are measured at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and any accumulated impairment losses. Depreciation is charged so as to allocate the cost of the assets less the residual value over the life of the assets.

If there is an indication that there has been a significant change in depreciation rate, useful life or residual value of an asset, the depreciation of that asset is revised prospectively to reflect the new expectations.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognized upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising from derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the profit or loss in the year the asset is derecognized.

2.3.5 Intangible Assets

Intangible assets acquired separately are measured on initial recognition at cost. Following initial recognition, intangible assets are carried at cost less any accumulated amortization and any accumulated impairment losses.

The useful lives of intangible assets are assessed to be finite. Intangible assets with finite lives are amortized over the useful economic life and assessed for impairment whenever there is an indication that the intangible asset may be impaired. The amortization period and the amortization method for an intangible asset with a finite useful life is reviewed at least at each financial year end. Changes in the expected useful life or the expected pattern of consumption of future economic benefits embodied in the asset is accounted for by changing the amortization period or method, as appropriate, and treated as changes in accounting estimates. The amortization expense on intangible assets with finite lives is recognized in the statement of comprehensive income in the expense category consistent with the function of the intangible asset.

2.3.5 Investment

Investment in Fixed Deposits is stated at their respective carrying amounts as at the reporting date.

Funds are invested only in government securities and fixed deposits. Investments are made after considering the higher yield on investment, liquidity, interest rate risk for reinvestment. All new investment, reinvestment and withdrawal decisions require the approval of the management committee.

2.3.6 Retirement Benefit Obligations

The council has both defined benefit and defined contribution plans. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the council pays fixed contributions to the employees. A defined benefit plans define an amount of pension benefit that an employee will receive on retirement, based on the years of service and compensation.

Defined contribution plans - Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund

All employees are eligible for Employees' Provident Fund and Employees' Trust Fund contributions in line with the prevalent statutes and regulations. The council contributes 15% and 3% of gross employee emoluments to EPF and ETF respectively.

Defined benefit plan - Gratuity

Provisions for retirement gratuity payable under the payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983 have been made for employees who have completed more than one year's continuous service with the council, in accordance with the Sri Lanka Accounting Standard No. 19 Employee Benefit. The liability to employees arises only on completion of five years continued service. However, under the Payment of Gratuity Act No. 12 of 1983, the liability arises only when an employee completes five years of continued services. The gratuity liability is not funded nor actuarially valued. Although the UGC Circular states that Gratuity would be paid at the rate of half a month per year of service, the council would pay at the rate of one mount per year. The consolidated Salary and the Cost of Living allowance would be considered as full Salary but not the Council Allowance.

2.3.8 Deferred income

Deferred income results when the council receives registration fees of the members for the coming several years at once. Deferred income is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income to the portion of registration fees that is relevant for the current financial year and the balance attributable to the remaining year is recognised as a liability on the statement of financial position until income is recognised.

2.3.9 Provisions

Provisions are recognized when the Council has a present obligation (legal or constructive) as a result of a past event, where it is probable that an outflow of resources embodying economic benefits will be required to settle the obligation and a reliable estimate can be made of the amount of the obligation. If the effect of the time value of money is material, provisions are determined by discounting the expected future cash flows at a pretax rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and, where appropriate, the risks specific to the liability. Where discounting is used, the increase in the provision due to the passage of time is recognized as an interest expense.

2.3.10 Trade and Other Receivables

Trade receivables are stated at the amounts they are estimated to realize net of allowances for bad and doubtful receivables.

Other receivables and dues from Related Parties are recognized at cost less allowances for bad and doubtful receivables.

2.3.11 Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognized to the extent that it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Council and the income and associated costs incurred or to be incurred can be reliably measured. Income is measured at the fair value of the consideration received or receivable.

The following specific criteria are used for the purpose of recognition of income.

a) Rendering of Services

Revenue from rendering of services is recognized in the accounting period in which the services are rendered or performed.

b) Interest Income

Interest Income is recognized as the interest accrues unless collectability is in doubt.

2.3.12 Expenditure Recognition

Expenses are recognized in the Income Statement on the basis of a direct association between the cost incurred and the earning of specific items of income. All expenses incurred and associated in the production of income, including those incurred in maintaining the property, plant and equipment in a state of efficiency have been charged to the statement of income and expenditure.
